

What is College Credit Plus?

College Credit Plus is Ohio's dual enrollment program where students earn both high school and college credit at the same time

- Students may apply to any public or participating private college
- Students may apply and take courses at multiple colleges



Who's Eligible?

- Students in grades 7-12
- Ohio residents
- Students who meet academic eligibility standards (*determined by the State*)
- Students who meet the admissions requirements for the college/university (*may be different for each college*)
- Students who are “College Ready”

What does it mean to be “College-Ready”?

More than just academically ready

- Emotional and social transition
- Meeting college expectations
- Time management and organizational skills
- Some college classes have content that is oriented toward a mature or adult student. College instructors will not modify the course content for CCP students.
 - Ohio requires new CCP students & parents to complete a Mature Content Permission Slip

How is College Different from High School?

	High School	College
Tests	Weekly or end of chapter	Fewer in number, but cover more material
Study Time	1 to 3 hours per day	2-3 hours per credit hours
Graded Work	Numerous quizzes, tests, and homework	Fewer tests & assignments, but worth more points
Learning	Information provided mostly in-class. Out-of-class research is minimal	More independent thinking, longer writing assignments, & out-of-class research
Responsibility	Daily verbal reminders in class	Email reminders, checking courses online daily
Attendance & Class Participation	Required, parents are notified if a student is absent	Attendance policy is determined by instructor, but no one is notified if a student is absent
Role of Parents	Parents are involved, working closely with teachers and counselors	The college views the student as an independent decisionmaker

FERPA

- The “Family Education Rights and Privacy Act” (FERPA)
 - Protects student education records
 - Parents do not have access to student’s academic records
 - Colleges reserve the right to communicate student record information with appropriate high school officials who have an “educational need to know”
 - “Permission to Release Information Form” – students written consent to share information with a third party
 - *This will give parents a limited access to their student’s records*

Benefits of CCP

- Students can:
 - Earn high school & college credits at the same time
 - Get a “head start” on career plans
 - Start & potentially complete a degree or certificate program
 - Understand the expectations of college life
 - Save tuition & textbook costs
 - Have more class opportunities & a flexible schedule

What Courses can Students Take?

- Students must meet prerequisites for all courses they take.
- Students must complete their first 15 credits in Level I courses
 - *These are transferable to public Ohio universities*
 - *See College/University's website for a list of Level I courses*
- Students can take courses that:
 - Fulfill high school graduation requirements
 - *Students must work with high school counselors to ensure they are meeting any mandatory testing or other high school requirements*
 - Part of a career pathway that interests them
 - Part of a major or degree requirement

Non-Allowable Courses

- Private applied courses with one-on-one instruction
 - *Example: guitar, piano, etc.*
- Courses with high fees
- Study abroad courses
- Physical education courses
 - *Example: yoga, weight-lifting, etc.*
- Pass/Fail graded courses
- Remedial courses or sectarian/religious courses

Grades & GPA

- CCP grades earned in college courses are the same grades that will appear on the high school transcript
- If a student fails or withdraws from the course, the college transcript and high school transcript will reflect the student's final grade.
- Grades will be factored into the high school and college GPA
- If a high school uses a weighted grading scale for Advanced Placement or Honors courses in a subject area, CCP courses in the same subject area will be weighted using the same scale
- Students must successfully complete the courses in order to earn the credit
- CCP grades/courses stay on the student's college transcript permanently

CCP Probation & Dismissal

Probation	Dismissal
<ul style="list-style-type: none">▪ A student will be placed on CCP Probation if they earn less than a cumulative 2.0 GPA in CCP courses or withdraws from 2 or more courses in one academic term▪ When on CCP Probation, the student may only enroll in one CCP course for one college semester and may not enroll in a college course in the same subject in which they previously earned a D, F, or W grade▪ Appeals*: students may submit an appeal to retake a course	<ul style="list-style-type: none">▪ If a student on CCP Probation does not increase their CCP GPA to a 2.0 or above during the probation semester, they will be placed on CCP Dismissal▪ While on CCP Dismissal, students may not enroll in any CCP courses▪ Appeals*: students may submit an appeal within 5 days of being dismissed, or wait until the end of the CCP Dismissal semester

*Each high school must have a policy describing the process for appeals

What Support Services are Available?

- High school guidance counselor
- College advisors/counselors
- Colleges provide the same academic supports to CCP students as they do traditional students
 - Learning Center/Tutoring
 - Library Access/Research Databases
 - Advising/Counseling
 - Accommodations (*IEP or 504 Plans*)

Will my Credits Transfer?

- Most courses will transfer, especially from one public college to another public college
- Students must check with colleges to confirm transferability
- Visit transfercredit.ohio.gov or transferology.com for more resources

Funding!

- Public school families automatically get 30 credit hours from the state
- **Private school families must apply for state funding**
 - Students must be awarded enough credit hours for the entire college course
 - If a student was not awarded enough credit hours for the entire college course, the family must pay for the entire course without state funds
- Some expenses are not covered (Ex: parking, transportation, calculators, optional materials, etc.)

How to Apply for Funding! Step 1 - OH ID Account!

- Parent/Guardian must create an OH|ID account at <http://ohid.ohio.gov>
- You can do this now!
- Allow a few days for the OH|ID to be assigned
- If a parent already has an OH|ID, the parent should use their existing OH|ID

Step 2 – Funding Application!

- Parent/Guardian will use the OH|ID account to log into the <http://safe.ode.state.oh.us/portal>
- Parent/guardian should follow the steps in the Instruction Manual to request access to the College Credit Plus Funding Application
 - The Instruction Manual will be available when the Funding Application is “opened” in February

Step 3 – Intent to Participate!

- When the parent/guardian has access to the funding application, one of the first sections to complete is the Intent to Participate
 - There is no separate form for this step. It is included in the electronic Funding Application
- Read the information and click on the appropriate field to confirm the Intent to Participate

Step 4 - Requesting Credits!

- As part of the CCP Funding Application, students/families need to request how many credit hours they want
 - Not the number of classes – **the number of CREDITS!**
- Classes can range from 1 to 5 credits
- Maximum credits to request is 30
- Funds are limited and students may not be awarded all credit hours that the student/family has requested
 - Could be different between siblings, in the same family
- Funding awards are distributed based on student grade level
 - 12th grade students are awarded first, then 11th grade, and so on until all funds are awarded
- Parent's income does not affect student's awarded credits

Step 5 – College Acceptance Letter!

- Complete all the sections of the Funding Application and upload the required documents
 - Private school students/families must upload the college acceptance letter indicating that the student has been admitted to the college
 - **Apply early for college admission in order to meet the final deadline of April 1**

Step 6 – Submit!

- Click on “Submit” when the application is finished
- **The deadline to submit the application is April 1**
- **You will receive an email confirmation that you successfully submitted the application**
- No exceptions to the deadline are available

Award Letters!

- Approximately 5 weeks after the CCP Funding Application deadline, “Credit Hour” funds will be awarded to families with completed applications
- Families will be instructed to log into the OH|ID portal to access and download the Funding Award Letter
- The number of “credit hours” a student is awarded is the maximum in which the student can enroll with state funds
- Families should provide the letter to the college they are attending
 - Colleges do not automatically get a copy

Option A & Option B!

Option A

- ❖ Allows the student to choose to earn both college and high school credit OR only college credit
- ❖ Must be elected at the time the student registers for college courses
- ❖ Students must inform the college and secondary school of electing Option A and credit the student wants to earn
- ❖ Students must work directly with the college to make payments
- ❖ Students/families that missed the April 1st deadline and still want to participate are option A or Self-pay CCP students.
- ❖ Any courses taken outside of the amount of credit hours awarded will be paid by the family under Option A, including tuition, fees, and textbooks.

Option B

- ❖ The default option of College Credit Plus
- ❖ When a student uses the state funds to pay for college courses
- ❖ Students will earn both college credit and high school credit at the same time
- ❖ Under Option B, students who have been awarded credit hours through the CCP Funding Application process will have all course tuition, fees, and textbooks paid by the state of Ohio.

Problems with Funding!

- If parents have difficulties with the Funding Application, contact CCP@education.ohio.gov for assistance as quickly as possible
- Keep in mind that many families will be applying and possibly seeking assistance – Apply early!
- **Remember, the Funding Application will be available in early February and the deadline is April 1**

CCP at Lakeland!

- Over 1,500 CCP students
- Roughly 1/3 of all Lakeland students
- 37 high schools
- 81% attend part-time

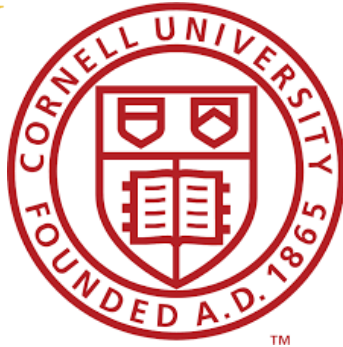

Lakeland Classes Opportunities:

- Lakeland courses can fulfill high school graduation requirements
 - Students must meet the prerequisites for any course they take!
- Lakeland offers classes that are 16-weeks, 12-weeks, or 8-weeks.
- Lakeland offers online, in-person, or hybrid courses
- CCP students have the first **TWO WEEKS** to drop a course at 100% refund, no penalty.
- Writing Center & Tutoring Services
- Honors Program (*available to High School Seniors with a GPA of 3.5 or higher*)

MATH Courses at Lakeland

- CCP students that want to take a "MATH" course at Lakeland still must meet the CCP admission criteria (*previous slide*)
- CCP students must take Algebra 2 at their high school before being eligible for "MATH" courses at Lakeland

 - ✓ Learn the test layout

 - ✓ College Board Next-Generation ACCUPLACER Placement Test Study App
 - ✓ Longsdale Online Course & Practice Tests

Take!

- ❖ REQUIRED - Bring photo ID or College Board Student ID Form
- ❖ Sign up is required online (*must apply to Lakeland first*)
- ❖ Test takes place on Lakeland's campus
- ❖ Not timed
- ❖ Uses computer-adaptive technology (*the response to each question determines the difficulty level of the next question*)
- ❖ Multiple choice
- ❖ Students have 2 attempts to meet the threshold (*a 3rd attempt may be allowed if student participates in a test prep activity*)

Students who utilize test prep resources, on average, improve their score by 8 points on the writing test & 10 points on the math test!

Middle School Students!

- Students entering the 7th, 8th, or 9th grade must take the Accuplacer Writing placement test, and test into college-level English in order to take any course at Lakeland.

 - FYEX 1000 – First Year Experience
 - COUN 1100 – Career Exploration

- Complete the CCP Online Orientation & CCP Student Questionnaire (*available via myLakeland, Blackboard*)

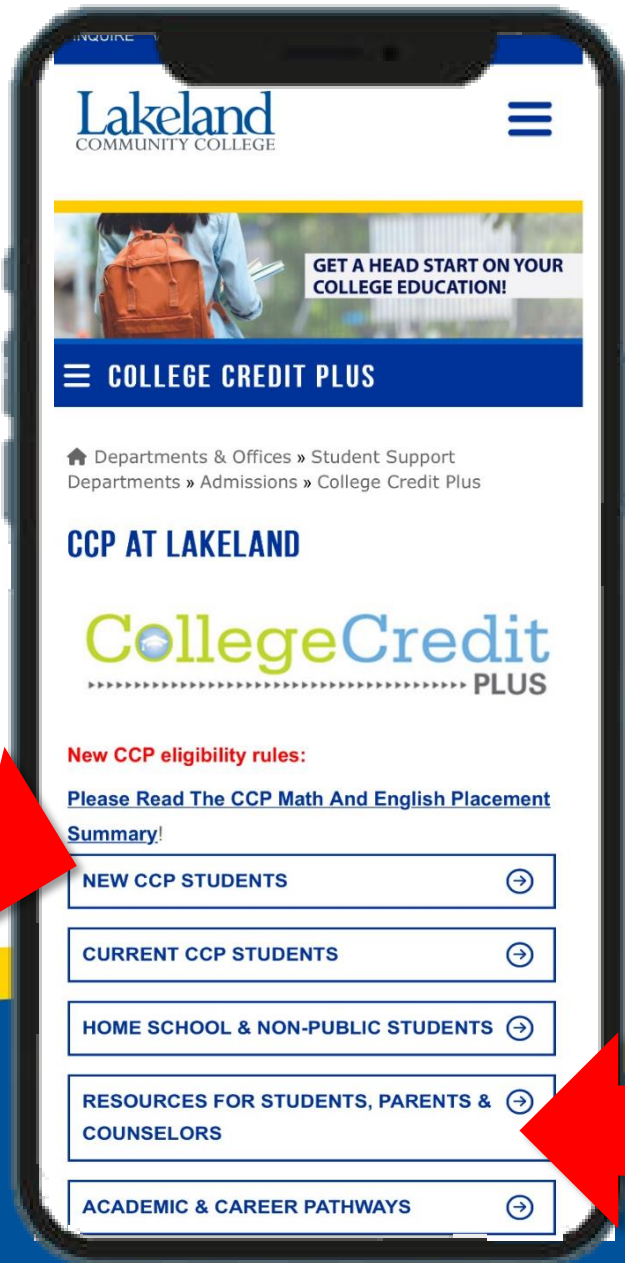
