

MLA Documentation for Tables and Figures

Tables

- All tables should be left-justified to the margin (not centered or otherwise embedded in text).
- Labels (Table 1), titles (i.e., “Dog vs. Cat Ownership...” use title case), and notes are double-spaced.
- Source (note form) doesn’t need to be listed in works cited if full source info is listed under table. Use commas between all elements and state names in normal first-last order.
- Source can represent either original source from which student creates new table or an actual table pulled from a source as is. May include the original table number along with page number if they exist in the source entry.

Example:

According to ASPCA, the percentage of people who own cats versus dogs is higher in the New England states but much lower in the remaining US regions (see table 1).

Figures

- Includes all visuals, images, diagrams, graphs, charts, etc. that are not specifically tables.
- Figures can be positioned anywhere within the text.
- Labels (Figure 2), captions (i.e., “This image shows that...” use sentence case), and notes are double-spaced. Do not include a title for figures—only a caption.
- Source (note form) doesn’t need to be listed in works cited if full source info is listed under figure. Use commas between all elements and state names in normal first-last order.

Example:

The ASPCA enjoys the loving competition between dog and cat owners, since it helps to improve the rate of adoption for all pets (see figure 2).

Tables

- Note appears below table and includes citation info. Must also have full entry in Reference list too.

Example:

Figures

- Includes all visuals, images, diagrams, graphs, charts, etc. that are not specifically tables.
- Figures can be positioned anywhere within the text.
- Labels (Figure 2), captions (i.e., “This image shows that...” use sentence case), and notes are double-spaced. Do not include a title for figures—only a caption.
- Caption appears below figures and includes citation info. Must have full entry in Reference list too.

Example:

America enjoys the loving competition between dog and cat owners, since it helps to improve the rate of adoption for all pets, as shown in Figure 2.
