

BIOGRAPHIES

DR. MATTHEW C. SAUNDERS

Dr. Matthew C. Saunders (born 1976, Austin, Texas, USA) is a Northeast Ohio composer, conductor, trombonist, husband and father. All his work is connected to teaching students from kindergarten to college in styles from madrigal to mariachi. He draws inspiration from the vastness of space, the waterways and forests, mountains and prairies of America, the motion of atoms, and the mysteries of existence, but most importantly from collaboration with other musicians and his students. He reads history, science, science fiction, classics and too

much social media. After a hard day's work, he relaxes on the couch with his wonderful wife, who is the love of his life and his teammate in the sport of parenting their children. On sunny days off, he bicycles and hikes, and hopes to bike the full length of the Ohio & Erie Canalway, from Cleveland to Bolivar, a short distance from the first home he remembers. He is lucky to live near Lake Erie, and he often pauses to look out over it for the glimpse of a freighter, or merely to contemplate the motion of the water. Dr. Saunders is a lover of both solitude and camaraderie, Cincinnati-style chili, road trips, movies and random facts. His favorite dinosaur is the Parasaurolophus, but he thinks the best dinosaur is the Stegosaurus. He keeps a running list of possible band names, and one day hopes to start one, singing clever songs about the world (as well as a few love songs) with plenty of vocal harmony. He gets excited about lots of music that he would never write or perform himself, and does what he can to share that with the world, too, because everyone's voice should be heard.

Dr. Saunders is professor of music and music and theater department chair at Lakeland Community College, where he also directs the Lakeland Civic Orchestra. Prior to coming to Lakeland, he held the position of associate professor of music and director of bands at Oklahoma Panhandle State University from 2007 to 2012. He received degrees in music from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music and The Ohio State University. Dr. Saunders studied composition with Donald Harris, Thomas Wells, Jan Radzynski and Wes Flinn, and trombone with Joseph Duchi and Tony Chipurn.

Dr. Saunders has been the director of the Lakeland Civic Orchestra since 2012, where he has championed the music of Northeast Ohio composers and commissioned works from Daniel Perttu, Olivia Kieffer, and Cooper Wood, and collaborated with performing faculty members from Kent State University, Cleveland State University, Baldwin Wallace University and Westminster University. Since 2012, the Lakeland Civic Orchestra has also

collaborated with the Lakeland Civic Chorus in performances of works by Schubert, Faure, Brahms and Bernstein. He has conducted college and community stage productions of "L'Enfant et les Sortileges," "Willy Wonka," "Sweeney Todd", "Grease" and "Little Women". In his position at Oklahoma Panhandle State University, Dr. Saunders was the director of bands, including concert. athletic and mariachi ensembles.

Dr. Saunders' original compositions have been performed across the country, including performances at national conferences of the National Flute Association, the International Horn Society, and the Society of Composers, and he has presented his research at conferences of the College Music Society and the Society of Composers, and at the Oklahoma Music Theory Roundtable and the Aspen Composers Conference. His works for large ensemble have been performed by the McConnell Arts Center Chamber Orchestra (Columbus, Ohio), the Marquette (Michigan) Symphony Orchestra, the University City (Missouri) Symphony Orchestra, at Eastern Illinois University, Kutztown University (Pennsylvania), Denison University (Ohio), Westminster College (Pennsylvania), Florida Gulf Coast University, Lakeland Community College (Ohio), Sinclair Community College (Ohio), West Texas A&M University, The Ohio State University, Kansas State University and Oklahoma Panhandle State University. His work "South Africa" for horn and marimba received support from the Meir Rimon Commissioning Assistance Fund of the International Horn Society and appears on faculty and graduate recitals across the United States and throughout the world. His arrangements for orchestra have been performed by the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, the Macon Symphony Orchestra, the Mankato Symphony Orchestra, the Georgia Philharmonic, the McConnell Arts Center Chamber Orchestra, the Ohio Northern Sinfonia and the Lakeland Civic Orchestra.

Dr. Saunders was elected to the Cleveland Composers Guild in 2012, and currently serves as secretary of that group, managing their Collegiate Composition Contest and Piece of the Day projects. With B.J. Brooks, he cohosted the 2012 Society of Composers Region VI Conference at West Texas A&M University. His collaboration with pianist Avguste Antonov has yielded performances of his solo piano works throughout the Plains and Midwest states, and led to the 2014 premiere of his Piano Concerto. Portions of his piano cycle "Starry Wanderers" appear on Antonov's 2014 CD "American Journey" on the Hartshorn Classical label, and Antonov premiered his piano cycle "The Rainbow's Daughter" in Chicago in 2017. His 2012 composition "Lady Glides on the Moon" appears on "Duo Eigentone," the debut CD by saxophonist Aaron Durst and percussionist David Kile, released in late 2019.

Dr. Saunders has appeared as soloist in multiple performances in his trombone concerto "Homo sapiens trombonensis," and in his 40-minute work for unaccompanied trombone, "Twenty Views of the Trombone," which received its first complete performance at Eyedrum in Atlanta in 2017, with excerpts performed in locations from New York City to Aspen, Colorado. He maintains a private trombone studio at the Fine Arts Association in Willoughby, Ohio, and also teaches composition to pre-college students.

Dr. Saunders' music is published by Imagine Music and online at www.martiandances.com, and he has written articles for "The Journal of Band Research," "Music Educators Journal," "The Chronicle of Higher Education," "The Society of Composers Newsletter" and "The Instrumentalist." He is on the web at www.martiandances.com, but the physical Dr. Saunders lives in Willowick, Ohio with his wife Becky and their children Noah and Melia. He is a native-born Texan, but considers Columbus, Ohio to be his hometown.

GUEST PERFORMER



Born in 2009, **SAYA UEJIMA** started piano at the age of six with Seiko Kaneshige. In 2016, she moved to the United States from Japan, and continued her piano study with Dr. Sebastian Birch and Dr. Yuka Nakayama-Lewicki. In 2021, she gave her first solo recitals at Kent State University and College of Wooster under their tutelage. Currently, she studies with Dr. Mayumi Kikuchi from The University of Akron.

Saya has won numerous prizes in both Japan and the United States. Her recent accomplishments include honorable mentions in the 2021 Ohio Music Teachers

Association State Buckeye Auditions and the 2020 Ohio MTNA State Competition. She placed first in the 2019 Steinway & Sons Junior Piano Competition (Division II) in Ohio and gold prize in the 24th Mie Music Concourse in Japan (2018). Uejima has performed in master classes with renowned artists such as Angela Cheng, Alvin Chow, Olga Radosavljevich and Dr. Gerardo Teissonnière. Uejima also has participated in various summer solo and chamber programs including the Cleveland Institute of Music Summer Sonata and the Summer Chamber Music Intensive at Conservatory of Music at Hudson Montessori School.

Uejima is actively involved in local music club activities and regularly performs for the Brahms Allegro Junior Music Club in Akron and the Junior MacDowell Club in Canton. In 2019, 2020 and 2021, she was invited to perform for the Tuesday Musical Club meetings to represent Brahms Allegro. In addition, she has performed for various events such as the Piano-a-thon to benefit Akron Children's Hospital, Ohio Federation of Music Clubs Junior music festivals and nursing home concerts. Outside of piano, Uejima likes math, Sudoku puzzles, cooking and opera. She is a member of the Brahms Allegro Junior Music Club and is an eighth grader at Green Middle School in Green, Ohio.

Program Notes

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart composed his A-major piano concerto in February and March 1786, apparently for one of the three subscription concerts he presented in Vienna that spring. The concerto is scored for flute, two clarinets, two bassoons, two horns, strings, and solo piano and lasts 25 minutes in performance.

In the hands of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, the pianoforte, named for its ability to play both soft (piano) and loud (forte) went from being a trendy curiosity to a staple of European music for the concert hall and home. Although some of his 27 piano concertos appear to have been intended for his students' use, Mozart composed the majority of his efforts in this genre as contributions to his own career as a piano soloist. As a result, their piano parts give an indication of the technical abilities of the composer, as well as the capabilities of the instruments available to Mozart: smaller, lighter and lacking the cast iron frame that would make the titanic concertos of the 19th century possible. We see, then, an instrument in flux, and the technique to go with it: light, detailed and often delicate, requiring a sensitivity of touch and gesture, even on the modern concert grand piano. The three movements of this A-major concerto provide opportunities for the 21st-century soloist to display all of these things, and Mozart's flawless orchestral scoring provides a backdrop for balanced, tasteful, and nuanced performance.

Emma Lou Diemer wrote "Festival Overture" in 1961, while she was composer-in-residence in the Arlington, Virginia schools through the Ford Foundation Young Composers Project from 1959-1961. The work received its first performance that year by a student orchestra. The work lasts seven minutes in performance, and is scored for two flutes, piccolo, two oboes, two clarinets, two bassoons, four horns, three trumpets, three trombones, tuba, timpani, snare drum, bass drum, crash cymbals, suspended cymbals and strings.

Emma Lou Diemer is a member of the generation of American composers who came of age just after World War II, and her music is influenced by the extraordinary variety of compositional trends and styles available to composers in the postwar period. Born in Kansas City, she gained recognition as a virtuoso pianist and organist by age 13, leading to studies in composition at Yale and the Eastman School of Music, where her teachers included Paul Hindemith, Bernard Rogers, Howard Hanson, Ernst Toch and Roger Sessions, all luminaries in mid-century concert music. While completing her doctorate at Eastman, she became composer-in-residence with the public schools in Arlington, Virginia, leading to a slew of works for young choral and orchestral musicians, including the present overture. Diemer went on to professorships at the University of Maryland and the University of California at Santa Barbara, where she established

the computer and electronic music center in 1973, and from where she retired in 1991. While her work demonstrates a variety of compositional approaches, including serialism, "Festival Overture" is rooted in the language of the modernism of the 1930s and 1940s, and shows the influence of Hindemith in its rhythmic vitality and use of contrapuntal techniques.

Edward Elgar composed his "Enigma Variations" in 1898 and 1899, based on an original theme. The first performance was led at St. James Hall, London by Hans Richter on June 19, 1899, and followed on September 13, 1899, with the composer conducting the Worcester Festival Orchestra in the first performance with the extended final variation. Lasting around 30 in performance, the variations are scored for two flutes (second doubling piccolo), two oboes, two clarinets, two bassoons, contrabassoon, four horns, three trumpets, three trombones, tuba, timpani, snare drum, triangle, cymbals, bass drum, optional organ and strings.

What is perhaps Elgar's best-known work (after the five "Pomp and Circumstance" marches), establishing his reputation as the foremost British composer after Henry Purcell, is also deeply personal and riddled with a degree of mystery. Beginning life as an improvised theme, at his wife Alice's suggestion, Elgar crafted a series of variations inspired by friends from Hereford: some friends were musical, some not, and most were newly made in 1899. Each variation is a thumbnail sketch of an individual. mostly in flattering lights, named only by initials or a coded clue as to the person's identity. Speculation and discussion quickly revealed the identities of the subjects of these cameos, which are readily available to the eager concertgoer. Elgar also hinted at another "enigma:" a second, hidden theme partnering with the given theme of the work. While many possibilities have been suggested, none has ever been definitively confirmed or even substantially agreed upon by musicians and scholars, and it seems that Elgar took at least one enigma to his grave. The ninth variation, "Nimrod," has become a symbol of British patriotism and is heard often at solemn state occasions in the same manner as Samuel Barber's "Adagio for Strings" in the United States. The finale, "E.D.U.," depicts the composer himself, giving, rather than initials, a cryptic spelling of the composer's family nickname, "Edoo." Contained within the finale is a reference to the first variation, "C.A.E," a depiction of Alice Elgar, whose husband's music would likely have languished without her tenacious support and encouragement.

HISTORY OF THE LAKELAND CIVIC ORCHESTRA

The Lakeland Civic Orchestra began in September 1937 as the Lake County Symphony Orchestra Association, founded by Mrs. Lorna Nighman, its first director, leading musicians from Lake and Geauga Counties. By February 1938, the group had grown to 30 members, and in June 1938, presented its first concert at Painesville Baptist Church. In 1951, the orchestra reorganized and renamed itself the Lake County Symphony Orchestra.

Around 1955, Charles Ruddick organized and began to lead the Willoughby Community Orchestra, a group providing concerts in the parks and other service functions. In 1970, the groups merged to become the Lakeland Civic Orchestra under the aegis of the recently established Lakeland Community College.

Since then, the Lakeland Civic Orchestra has pursued the dual missions of providing Lake County residents with opportunities to play and hear orchestral music, while fulfilling the performing ensemble requirement for many Lakeland Community College music students. The annual Young Artists Concerto Competition has been an important step in the careers of budding young musicians, with the winners performing with the orchestra as soloists. Additionally, the orchestra has collaborated with choral ensembles, including the Lakeland Civic Chorus, and with the wide range of professional soloists and composers in Northeast Ohio.

With the 2019-2020 season cut short immediately after our March 8, 2020 concert, the musicians of the orchestra went on an 18-month forced hiatus from in-person rehearsal and performance, returning in November 2021, and producing in the meantime two virtual concert videos, in which each musician recorded their own part at home.

For 85 years, the musicians of Lake, Cuyahoga, Geauga and Ashtabula counties have come together to bring orchestral music to our community. They rehearse one weekday evening per week because of their passion for music and love for the act of music making and perform four times per year. We are open to all community members by audition and would love to have you join us for the next phase of our history!

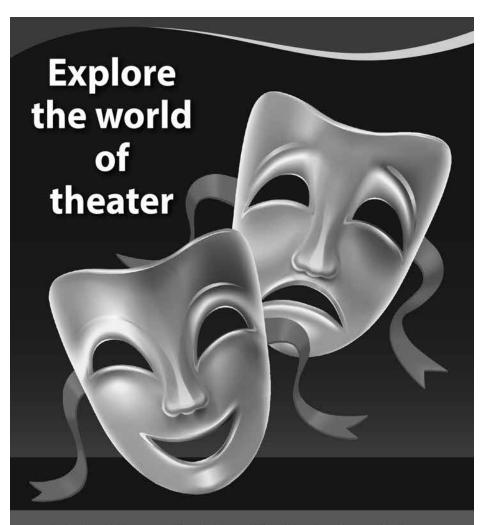
